What we do lack though, are younger ringers, something we had in our formative years, which we would like to improve on now. It's not an unusual situation, and generally improves once you get one or two started as young people naturally like to be around other young people. A tower in our Chippenham Branch that is successful in this direction is Colerne, where Roger Haynes, the Tower Captain, and also the Chairman of the Glos & Bristol Association, has strong links with the village school. whose final year children all have a visit to the bell tower. Roger very kindly helped us out, when we had a visit by the Junior section of Malmesbury Young Farmers Club, when over twenty visitors including their leaders came one Friday evening in July, to learn about bell ringing. Roger brought four young ringers, two of which had competed in the recent National Youth Competition in London, which was a lot better than just being met by grey haired, old people! The result was they all had a go, as did their leaders, which all helps in making people aware of bell ringing. Many young ringers go to a University where there is an opportunity to really progress and have a lot of social fun with other ringers, as well as the ringing.

In the same week as the Young Farmers visited, we also had a visit by the "Old Farmers", as I refer to them, and have myself joined. On the second Tuesday of the month, organised by Joyce Smith, the Malmesbury Branch of the Wiltshire Farmers Club meet in the Village Hall, but on that occasion they came to the Church and also learnt about bell ringing, with a couple of them having a go.

On November 17th, there will be a Service at 3.00pm to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the dedication of our bells for the Millennium, the service will be taken by the Archdeacon, the Venerable Christopher

Bryan, which will be followed with a tea in the village hall. 25 years may not seem like a very long time, but for those of us that were involved from the start, there wouldn't be many around in another

25 years! Charlton was one of the 150 towers that received a grant out of the £3million Lottery Fund, and sadly not all of those are still being rung on a regular basis, so we certainly have something to celebrate.

#### CHARLTON PARISH CHAT OCT/NOV 24 - PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

#### Reminder:Defibrillator – what to do...

- Someone is unresponsive, not breathing normally. Dial 999 and ask for an ambulance.
- Start CPR 30 chest compressions, 2 breaths, repeat and keep repeating.
- If you are alone with the casualty it is far better to do CPR than to go to fetch the defibrillator. However if anyone else is with you or you can shout and call anyone else send them for the defib.
- EMERGENCY DEFIBRILLATOR AED
- You need to understand the 400-metre Rule when you call 999, the operator's computer will not tell the operator about our defibrillator if your location is further than 400 metres away from the defib, so the 999 operator can't tell you. That doesn't matter you know where it is so you can go and get it or send someone else to get it.
- The cabinet on the Village Hall outer wall is unlocked. Open the defib when it gets to you it starts operating as soon as you open it up. It tells you what to do, with a recorded voice. It cannot do any harm to the casualty it will not give a shock unless it detects that the casualty needs a shock.
- But tell anyone else in the vicinity to stand back before shocking.
- Keep going with CPR until the ambulance arrives.

#### **Potholes Etcetera**

- Potholes in the roads are a menace but the quicker you report them to Wilts Council the quicker they can be dealt with. <u>Anyone can report them</u>.
- You should report them on the 'My Wilts' app – specially written for all sorts of reports to Wilts Council – including potholes and fly-tipping etc. The link is:
  - www.wiltshire.gov.uk/mywilts-online-reporting.
- If you do not have internet access you can report by telephone but this is much more expensive for Wilts Council – a drain on your Council Tax. But the PC will help – you can report them to the Parish Clerk if you do not have internet access.


- Wiltshire Highways will send an engineer to inspect all potholes that are reported, to decide whether and how quickly (ie at what priority) they should be filled.
  - o If you want to know the criteria applied search on-line for the Wiltshire Highways Safety Inspection Manual.
- The same system works for all other highway defects.

### Planning Applications – how the PC deals with them

 When news of a planning application arrives it is sent by the Parish Clerk to all Councillors. Councillors look up all the papers on-line on the Wilts Council website.

Contd...

- If it appears uncontentious and no Councillor detects that any residents are concerned about it, or has concerns of their own, it will be decided by Councillors commenting by email. The Clerk would then send a 'No Objection' to Wilts Council.
- If an application is judged to be potentially contentious, or if any concern expressed by a resident comes to the attention of the PC, or if any Councillor him/her self has any concerns, then it will be decided in a PC meeting (open to the public of course as all PC meetings are).
- you have concerns about any planning applications, as well as lodging your own view on the relevant Wilts Council webpage (this is the important bit) do pass your view to the PC, via any Councillor, who will pass it on, or to the Parish Clerk by email please.
- So far this year the PC has considered 20 planning applications.

The final event that we would like to bring to your attention is the Charlton Recreational Committee's AGM. In these austere times, it is proving difficult to gain access to improvement funds for the hall. #### A letter from Rachel Swatton, Licensed Lay Minister

So what?

If you spend any time on social media, or out with friends, or in the pub, you'll see how enraged people get when they see something they perceive as incorrect or unjust. From the smallest grammatical error to the atrocities of war, people are extremely vocal in expressing their distaste regarding what is wrong in our world.

As I write this the Olympics have recently finished, and the world has listened with horror and revulsion to the fate of Olympian, Rebecca Cheptegei, who was set on fire by her ex boyfriend on her return home, and died from her injuries. We are quite rightly outraged by such an inhuman action, and the media is flooded with people giving their opinion on this.

The war in Israel rages on, with reports from both sides about the terrible wrongs being perpetrated against their people.

Refugees face unimaginable risks to try to find their way to safe haven, but even in countries such as our own, the situation in which they find themselves and the way they are treated is a very poor reflection on us. The media is only too happy to shout about the situation with each perspective taking its own, often opposing, view.

So many opinions, so many voices...so what? So what are we DOING about it? We know of the Olympic runner only because she was famous, and yet every day, all over the world and on our own doorsteps, people die or have their lives irrevocably changed by domestic violence.

We may not be able to head into a war zone to fight or protect, but are we just talking about it, or are we pressuring our governments, spending our money only with companies who aren't making financial gain because of bloodshed, and insuring those brave souls who do venture into war zones to help are doing so fully and financially equipped and supported?

Are we actively trying to seek the facts regarding refugees, the homeless or dispossessed, or having our opinions shaped by the loudest voice? Are we putting our money where our mouths are and offering support? Are we, even for one moment, putting ourselves into their shoes and asking what should we do about it?

All of us who have any moral compass have a duty to do more than just talk about how bad a situation is but rather, to actually do something about it. Those of us who call ourselves Christians are particularly challenged – we are under orders to do so!

What good is it if someone claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save them? Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead.

Our world is far from perfect but, whether we have any faith or none, every single one of us, by our mere existence, WILL change the world. Whether we chose to change it for better or for worse is up to us.

display.




In addition to the exhibition of work there will be members there to show visitors some of the "tricks of the trade" and give visitors the opportunity to have a go.






