Charlton, D-Day, 80 years ago

It's difficult for us now to imagine what it was like here 80 years ago. The commonly known rigours of wartime - rationing, shortages, conscription, the blackout etc. did apply here too, however as a rural community, although we were spared the horrors of the blitz there were very significant military activities in the local area.

Throughout the war, there were many local airfields; Kemble, Hullavington and South Cerney still evident, but also at Long Newnton, The Leigh (towards Cricklade), and a decoy field just NE of Minety. As a result of the proximity of the airfields a number of aircraft crash landed in the vicinity.

The occasional bomb was dropped nearby - in 1941 one landed on the road at Five Lanes making a deep crater. There is also a story of a lone German fighter plane shooting at some gardeners in the village.

More locally, Charlton Park mansion was used as a military hospital, and very many people were employed in military related war work at the secret Ekco radar factory at Cowbridge and Linolite in Malmesbury.

In the lead up to D-Day the military activity in the area greatly intensified... see the centre pages of the Chat.

WOMAD (25-28 July)

It has not yet been possible to confirm with WOMAD whether they will again be able to offer us what they normally do. The usual offer is listed here. If anything changes we will inform you through the Charlton Hub Facebook group and through the notice boards.

- WOMAD usually offer free entry on the Thursday to residents of Charlton Parish. This is Thu 25 Jul. Entry is normally controlled by means of a letter authorising entry by a small group – you will not need one for every person going in. Send a stamped self-addressed envelope stating how many letters you need to the Parish Clerk – M R Bromley Gardner, Coombe Cottage, SN16 9DR.
- Additionally, WOMAD usually allow passage on foot and bicycle through the Park Street gate to those who hold tickets for WOMAD.
- Also there is usually an additional allocation of SN16 reduced-rate tickets especially for Charlton Parish. Contact the Parish Clerk for these. But only if you find they are sold out at the Box Office (which for the past few years they have not been).

WOMAD Noise

- The PC is aware that some residents are troubled by the WOMAD late-night noise. There appears to be something technical about the way that noise travels that means that some residents are more troubled by it than others.
- The PC is now negotiating with WOMAD to try to reduce the noise impact.

- At the 9 May PC meeting Tom Blanden was re-elected by the Cllrs as Chairman for the year ahead.
- David Rawlings was elected as Deputy

Chairman, taking over from Marion Adkins who stood down after being Chair from 2013-19 and Deputy Chair 2019 to this year; Marion remains as a Cllr and the RFO – Responsible Finance Officer, ie she keeps the accounts.

Patients Participation Group (PPG)

- A PPG is a partnership between the Surgery and the patients enabling good communication between them to improve the quality of the service that is provided.
- The Malmesbury Primary Care Centre PPG is comprised of patient volunteers who are essentially "Area Representatives" for their Village or locality. They are supported by the Doctors and Practice Manager who meet with them bi monthly and discuss healthcare issues, both national and local, large and small so that the members can then relay points back to their community through local networks.
 - Purpose of the PPG
 - To enable the patients to have a voice in the provision of health-care in their area.
 - To give both staff and patients the chance to discuss health topics of interest.
 - Patients can give constructive feedback, requests and suggestions.

Charlton currently has no representative on the PPG. Can you be this person?

Mike Brummitt died unexpectedly at home on Sunday, the 12th. He was 85. He and Annie lived in Yew Tree Cottage (next to the pub) for many years. He was a much loved GP in Malmesbury for many years.

A letter from our Lay Minister Rachel Swatton LLM

I made the mistake of reading an article in the Telegraph today entitled 'Vandals have taken over the Church of England' and for me, its content cannot go unchallenged!

The premise of the article is that traditional church and choral music is being destroyed, along with any semblance of history, by the current church leadership in the name of wokeness and 'diversity'. It sites the closure of a couple of cathedral choirs as its basis for this theory. The article ends ' It seems particularly poignant that the custodians of our history are busy destroying the heritage they are supposed to defend just when we most need things that bind us together. Thanks to the false god of "outreach", the Church of England is severing them.'

There are several points I take issue with here. First and foremost, 'outreach' is a direct instruction from Jesus, a foundation stone of the church and the reason for its creation, from the first days of Christianity – hardly a 'false god'!

Second, diversity amongst believers in God was pretty much invented by Jesus, who came to open the faith of the Jews to all – Paul's letter to the Galatians reminds us

'There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.'

Diversity is also part of the bedrock of our church.

Third, the article entirely fails to address the reasons churches are making, or being forced to make, these decisions preferring to simply accuse those in authority of some sinister plot to undermine the whole institution. Nowhere does it mention the £1000s of pounds required to run a cathedral choir – Westminster cathedral states their choir costs £500,000 a year to maintain, and that doesn't include the cost of repairs and servicing instruments. Even our little parish church organ had a quote several years ago of £32,000 to overhaul it. We spend a lot of money every year on an instrument played a dozen times a year! And therein lies a further problem, one that affects all areas of the Church of England, and at the heart of so many of its troubles. There simply isn't enough people and that means there isn't enough money. Fewer and fewer churches are able to find an organist or choir members. Fewer people are coming forward to train as ministers, or are coming forward much later in life after following a different career path. The church is often vilified for there no longer being one parish, one priest, but until there are enough priests and enough congregants to go around, this will continue to be the case. People blame the church, but in fact society as a whole has moved on and changed the way it works, and the church's resistance to that change has been its undoing.

I in no way advocate the dissolution of the traditional types and styles of worship and music found in our churches – they are woven into the very fibre of what we are – I have a lifetime of memories of turning pages for my organist father, of learning to read from the prayer book in church at my mother's side, of singing in the choir or surrounded by family and friends, bathed in candlelight every Christmas, of allowing the words of a much loved hymn or oft repeated prayer wash over me as its meaning sunk deep into my soul – but I also see how we have distanced ourselves from the people we are here to serve. On a local level we, like many churches, are turning outwards – we are opening our doors and reaching out into our villages, striving to bring the church back to the

beating heart of our communities, to love and to serve all those around us, not just those who come to church on a Sunday morning. We are striving to involve young people in worship, to welcome newcomers, to feed and nurture our congregations, and to treasure and protect our worshipful heritage, whilst still acknowledging its imperfections. When I'm asked 'why the Church if England rather than another denomination?' my answer has always been that I love the diversity of the church. I love that whatever your preferred style of worship you can find a home here, that biblical beliefs and principals are upheld, but that we are free to express the love of Jesus and our love for Him in many and varied ways. True diversity (not the artificially created construct) is the lifeblood of our churches, not its undoing. No two churches or communities are quite the same, and I thank God for it.

But each and every church is moulded by the nature of the people who attend – if the church of tomorrow matters to you, the only way to shape it for the future is to attend and support it in the present.



GREAT ACTIVITY ALONG THE B4040

Charlton started to be affected by the build-up to D-Day during 1943 - roads between the village and Minety were closed to public traffic and used for the storage and maintenance of thousands of military vehicles in preparation for the invasion. The map above shows the extent of the closures: from near the current pumping station, on leaving the village right up to Minety crossroads, and extending out past Braydon pond and back via Moor Lane.

Entrance to this restricted area was via gates which were manned by armed guards, and only military personnel, together with people who lived in this enclosed area plus essential workers, e.g. Doctors, were issued with passes that allowed access.


There were several large workshop buildings preparing the many vehicles that were parked along both sides of these closed roads for the invasion. This preparation included modifications to enable amphibious beach landings - sealing them to prevent water ingress and extending the exhaust pipes up into the air. This work was done on general transport vehicles (trucks, jeeps etc) and armoured vehicles e.g. tanks, although tank storage was located elsewhere.


Then when D-Day happened all these vehicles were driven off to the ports (Weymouth?) to be taken across the channel. The route that had to be taken went through the centre of Malmesbury, there being no bypass at that time. This amount of heavy traffic, including many tracked vehicles, turned the road into something like a ploughed field - particularly due to the way tanks skid round sharp corners. Some broken down vehicles remained along the B4040, being eventually removed in late 1945.

During this extraordinary exodus one highly memorable incident is recorded where a tank driver misjudged a corner in the centre of town and poked his gun through the wall of a shop and right through into the sitting room beyond. He just reversed out and drove on as if nothing had happened!

Charlton residents will also have seen many towed gliders carrying airborne troops these having taken off from Blakehill farm airfield, The Leigh.

Charlton Park hospital and troop encampment

During the war Charlton Park was used by various military hospital units; British, American and sometimes both at the same time. Very temporary many buildings were erected for wards. operating theatres etc. but most personnel were living under canvas.

Just before D-Day the US 120th Station Hospital transferred from Cirencester Park to the Park and they received their first patients on 21st June. The wounded admitted during June were almost all German Prisoners of War, recently evacuated from France by air. During October and December 1944, the Hospital mainly functioned as a German Prisoner of War Hospital. During the months of January and February 1945, the Hospital continued to operate at its maximum bed capacity of 1,311.

120th Station Hospital closed in May 1945.

Also in the Park in June '44 was the British 23rd General Hospital. They left in September that year.

In preparation for D-Day a very large number of US troops were accommodated under canvas in the Park. The most reported fact about this is that the very many black soldiers were kept entirely separate from the white ones - a difficult thing to be reminded of now.

A story about socialising between the black troops and the local population: "they used to come up in the evenings, they weren't allowed to come in the light, and they delivered us tins of fruit and chewing gum, all sorts of things, because you couldn't get it in the war. They used to take my father up to the Horse and Groom for a drink".
